# "THE ROMAN EMPIRE: ARCHITECTURE & IDEOLOGY" (CLST 272)



3 CREDITS/AICE \* MAY 16-31, 2025 \* NO PRE-REQS

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### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This summer study abroad course introduces students to ancient Roman art and architecture from the death of Julius Caesar (44 BCE) to the rise of Christianity (4th century CE). Pre-departure presentations and readings prepare students to investigate and interpret Roman archaeological sites in their historical and cultural contexts.

The course begins in the Naples-area with visits to the Greek city of Paestum and the Roman cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum and then moves to Rome, where students will examine how the political and military ambitions of the Roman elite shaped the development of the city and its architecture. In particular, students will visit the Roman Forum, Colosseum, and Pantheon; Vatican City; Etruscan "cities of the dead"; and many other sites in and around Rome.

### **COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe stylistic elements associated with a work or artistic genre (AICE);
- 2. Identify the socio-political, historical, cultural, or economic context with which a work or artistic genre is commonly associated (AICE);
- 3. Demonstrate factual knowledge of Roman institutions (CLST);
- 4. Demonstrate factual knowledge of Roman material culture (CLST);
- 5. Evaluate material culture within its original cultural context (CLST).

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### Pre-Departure Quizzes and Exam

Prior to departure, students will take three quizzes (multiple choice) and an exam (short-answer) via Scholar based on assigned readings and presentations covering essential background material.

### **Travel Essays**

Students will submit five travel essays on ancient sites that we do <u>not</u> visit as a group. The essays should include images as well as a description of the historical context and prominent artistic/architectural features. A list of suggested sites will be provided, but students may visit any relevant site of interest.

#### **Onsite Worksheets**

Students working in teams assigned by the instructors will be given worksheets downloaded to their phones that require analysis of onsite features, such as art, architecture, decoration, and infrastructure.

### Onsite Presentation (15-20 minutes + Q&A)

Students working in assigned pairs will deliver an onsite presentation, in which they describe the significance, historical context, and artistic/architectural features of a building or monument.

### Final Exam

Students will take a comprehensive final exam while in Rome.

### **Course Policies**

### **Physical Demands**
